**Slumbering Prophets and
the Escape from Self:
How the Book of Jonah Mines and
Undermines the Story of Noah**

After a close reading and literary comparison of these two stories, we will address the question of humanity's potential for genuine and enduring self-transformation.

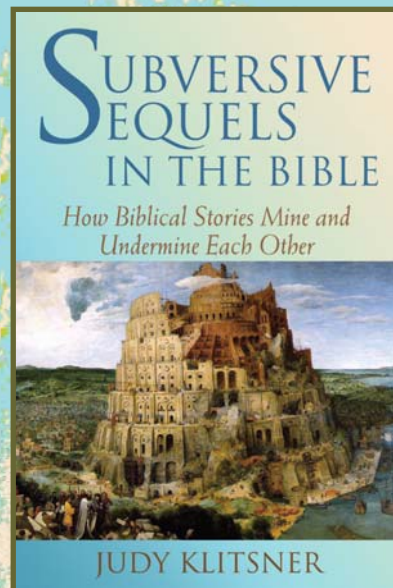


**The “Seeing” and “Taking” of Sarah:
